SUBJECT: Pneumococcal Vaccination for High-risk Patients

The purpose of this memo is to remind medical providers to assess their high-risk adult and pediatric patients to determine if they are appropriate candidates for pneumococcal vaccines. These vaccines can offer additional protection against some complications of influenza, such as pneumonia. This is extremely important in light of the current Novel H1N1 influenza outbreak. Complete information on Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP) recommendations for the use of pneumococcal polysaccharide (PPV23) and pneumococcal conjugate (PCV7) vaccines can be found on the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) website at <http://www.cdc.gov/vaccines/pubs/ACIP-list.htm>

State-supplied PPV23 is available only for high-risk children age 2 through 18 years of age and state supplied pneumococcal conjugate (PCV 7) is available for children > 2 months through 59 months of age who are VFC eligible **and** all underinsured children regardless of where they receive their immunizations. Currently, children whose health insurance covers the full cost of PCV7 are not eligible for state-supplied PCV7. Privately purchased vaccine will need to be used for those patients who are not eligible for these state-supplied vaccines.
